

AFRICA

We are all aware there are many needs throughout the continent of Africa. Since



WAGC was founded in 2004, we have been working in several small rural villages in Kenya and Zambia. This work has been incredibly successful. With the help of our supporters thousands of people in Africa have been helped through free

medical camps, dental clinics and eye glass screenings.

In order to accomplish this, WAGC formed teams of health care professionals (and others) who volunteered their skills during two week mission trips. The foundation raised thousands of dollars to purchase medicine and supplies which were used to provide free medical care to more than 10,300 villagers. With the help of local Lions Clubs we distributed over 1,600 pair of eyeglasses to those who previously had no opportunity to obtain them.

On our most recent mission trip in August 2010 we visited the Grippis Farm community, a small village in Zambia. In addition to the Vision Clinics we financed and built a new well and began work with the villagers to construct their first brick school building. APPALACHIA

Many of us are not aware of the poverty that exists within our own country, especially in the region we call Appalachia, running down through the eastern states from southern New York to northern Georgia. Within a few hours' drive for those of us who live in the East, children are born into conditions that resemble life in a third world country: dilapidated and crowded housing; no plumbing or clean running water; limited access to public utilities, social services, and medical care; substandard schools and education.



WAGC collects and transports essential items to Kentucky such as household goods, personal care products and home repair supplies while a local organization screens applicants and distributes donations. Currently this program is on hold as we are seeking a new warehouse location. We need a 3,000 - 4,000 sq. ft. space with a loading dock and rest room facility with running water. NATIVE AMERICANS

Once, their nation was proud and strong. Now, they are the poorest of America's poor. Native Americans living on reservations are the most impoverished people in our nation. From 1980 to 2000, the counties that make up Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota comprised the poorest of our nation's 3,143 counties.

Pine Ridge Reservation, home to the Oglala Lakota (Sioux) Nation numbering approximately 40,000 persons, is the second-largest Native American reservation in the United States.

Many of the Lakota homes lack basic water and sewage systems as well as electricity. More than half the Reservation's adults battle addiction and disease. Alcoholism, diabetes, heart disease, cancer, and malnutrition are pervasive.

The population is slowly but steadily rising, despite the severe conditions on the Reservation, as more and more Oglala Lakota return home from far-away cities to live within their societal values, be with their families, and assist with the revitalization of their culture and their Nation.

WAGC has conducted free vision screenings and eyeglass distribution at 4 schools from K-8th grade in the Shannon County district of Pine Ridge along with vision clinics at the Porcupine Medical Clinic.



The team plans to return to work within the school system to extend this work to more children. Please contact us if you are interested in learning more about the program, have used eyeglasses to donate, or would like to contribute towards our winter fuel program.
